Long-acting reversible contraceptives (LARCs), like the IUD or implant, are the most effective methods. They can help you live your dreams and wait until you are ready to start a family.





# Not ready to get pregnant?

### Think about an **IUD** or **Implant**





#### IUDs and implants are the most effective contraceptive methods.

If using an IUD or implant, 99 women in 100 will be protected from unintended pregnancy.



#### 6 Reasons to Think About an IUD or Implant

- Safe for young women, even those who have not had a child or are not married
- Effective at preventing pregnancy
- 3 Private not visible to others
- Convenient no daily pills to take or injections to schedule
- Removable when you're ready to get pregnant
- 6 Long-acting protection against pregnancy

IUD (intrauterine device) Such as "Copper-T"	A small, T-shaped piece of <b>soft</b> <b>plastic</b> .	Provides protection against pregnancy,* and stays where placed for up to 12 years, depending on IUD type	Carefully inserted into the <b>uterus</b> by a trained health provider	Yes. When the IUD or implant is removed by a trained health provider, a woman can become pregnant right away.	Side effects are common, but some women do not experience them. They are not a sign of illness and are often manageable. Talk with a healthcare provider to learn more.
Implant Such as "NXT"	One or two small, flexible rods, about the size of a matchstick	Provides protection against pregnancy,* and stays where placed for 3 to 5 years, depending on implant type	Carefully inserted into the inner side of either <b>upper arm</b> by a trained health provider		

\*IUDs and implants protect against pregnancy, but they do not protect against STIs or HIV. A condom should be used with an IUD or implant to prevent these infections.
